#### RELATING TO FOOD AND DRUGS -- THE EDWARD O. HAWKINS AND THOMAS C. SLATER MEDICAL MARIJUANA ACT

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 21-28.6-4 of the General Laws in Chapter 21-28.6 entitled "The
 Edward O. Hawkins and Thomas C. Slater Medical Marijuana Act" is hereby amended to read as
 follows:

#### 21-28.6-4. Protections for the medical use of marijuana.

5 (a) A qualifying patient cardholder who has in his or her possession a registry 6 identification card shall not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied 7 any right or privilege, including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a 8 business or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau, for the medical use of 9 marijuana; provided, that the qualifying patient cardholder possesses an amount of marijuana that 10 does not exceed twelve (12) mature marijuana plants that are accompanied by valid medical 11 marijuana tags, two and one-half (2.5) ounces of usable marijuana, or its equivalent amount, and 12 an amount of wet marijuana to be set by regulations promulgated by the departments of health and business regulation. Said plants shall be stored in an indoor facility. 13

(b) An authorized purchaser who has in his or her possession a registry identification card shall not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied any right or privilege, including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a business or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau, for the possession of marijuana; provided that the authorized purchaser possesses an amount of marijuana that does not exceed two and one-half (2.5) ounces of usable marijuana, or its equivalent amount, and this marijuana was
 purchased legally from a compassion center for the use of their designated qualifying patient.

3 (c) A qualifying patient cardholder, who has in his or her possession a registry 4 identification card, shall not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied 5 any right or privilege, including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a 6 business or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau, for selling, giving, or 7 distributing, on or before December 31, 2016 to a compassion center cardholder, marijuana of the 8 type, and in an amount not to exceed, that set forth in subsection (a), that he or she has cultivated 9 or manufactured pursuant to this chapter.

(d) It shall be unlawful for any employer to refuse to hire, discharge, or otherwise
discriminate against a person with respect to any terms, conditions or privileges of employment,
or any other matter directly or indirectly related to employment because of their status as a
cardholder, including because of a positive drug test for marijuana components or metabolites,
unless the patient cardholder possessed marijuana or was impaired on the premises of the place of
employment or during the hours of employment.

16 (d)(e) No school, employer, or landlord may refuse to enroll, employ, or lease to, or 17 otherwise penalize, a person solely for his or her because of their status as a cardholder. Provided, 18 however, due to the safety and welfare concern for other tenants, the property, and the public, as a 19 whole, a landlord may have the discretion not to lease, or continue to lease, to a cardholder who 20 cultivates marijuana in the leased premises.

21 (e)(f) A primary caregiver cardholder, who has in his or her possession a registry 22 identification card, shall not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied 23 any right or privilege, including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a 24 business or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau, for assisting a patient cardholder, to whom he or she is connected through the department of health's registration 25 26 process, with the medical use of marijuana; provided, that the primary caregiver cardholder 27 possesses an amount of marijuana that does not exceed twelve (12) mature marijuana plants that 28 are accompanied by valid medical marijuana tags, two and one-half (2.5) ounces of usable 29 marijuana, or its equivalent amount, and an amount of wet marijuana set in regulations 30 promulgated by the departments of health and business regulation for each qualified patient 31 cardholder to whom he or she is connected through the department of health's registration 32 process.

33 (f)(g) A qualifying patient cardholder shall be allowed to possess a reasonable amount of
 34 unusable marijuana, including up to twelve (12) seedlings that are accompanied by valid medical

marijuana tags. A primary caregiver cardholder shall be allowed to possess a reasonable amount
of unusable marijuana, including up to twenty-four (24) seedlings that are accompanied by valid
medical marijuana tags and an amount of wet marijuana set in regulations promulgated by the
departments of health and business regulation.

5 (g)(h) There shall exist a presumption that a cardholder is engaged in the medical use of 6 marijuana if the cardholder:

7

(1) Is in possession of a registry identification card; and

8 (2) Is in possession of an amount of marijuana that does not exceed the amount permitted 9 under this chapter. Such presumption may be rebutted by evidence that conduct related to 10 marijuana was not for the purpose of alleviating the qualifying patient's debilitating medical 11 condition or symptoms associated with the medical condition.

(h)(i) A primary caregiver cardholder may receive reimbursement for costs associated
 with assisting a qualifying patient cardholder's medical use of marijuana. Compensation shall not
 constitute sale of controlled substances.

(i)(j) A primary caregiver cardholder, who has in his or her possession a registry identification card, shall not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied any right or privilege, including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a business or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau, for selling, giving, or distributing, on or before December 31, 2016 to a compassion center cardholder, marijuana, of the type, and in an amount not to exceed that set forth in subsection (e), if:

(1) The primary caregiver cardholder cultivated the marijuana pursuant to this chapter,
not to exceed the limits of subsection (e); and

(2) Each qualifying patient cardholder the primary caregiver cardholder is connected with
through the department of health's registration process has been provided an adequate amount of
the marijuana to meet his or her medical needs, not to exceed the limits of subsection (a).

26 (j)(k) A practitioner shall not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, 27 or denied any right or privilege, including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action 28 by the Rhode Island board of medical licensure and discipline, or by any other business or 29 occupational or professional licensing board or bureau solely for providing written certifications, 30 or for otherwise stating that, in the practitioner's professional opinion, the potential benefits of the

31 medical marijuana would likely outweigh the health risks for a patient.

32 (k)(1) Any interest in, or right to, property that is possessed, owned, or used in connection
 33 with the medical use of marijuana, or acts incidental to such use, shall not be forfeited.

34 (<u>h(m)</u> No person shall be subject to arrest or prosecution for constructive possession,

conspiracy, aiding and abetting, being an accessory, or any other offense, for simply being in the
 presence or vicinity of the medical use of marijuana as permitted under this chapter, or for
 assisting a qualifying patient cardholder with using or administering marijuana.

4 (m)(n) A practitioner, nurse, nurse practitioner, physician's assistant, or pharmacist shall
5 not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied any right or privilege,
6 including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a business or occupational or
7 professional licensing board or bureau solely for discussing the benefits or health risks of medical
8 marijuana or its interaction with other substances with a patient.

9 (n)(o) A qualifying patient or primary caregiver registry identification card, or its 10 equivalent, issued under the laws of another state, U.S. territory, or the District of Columbia, to 11 permit the medical use of marijuana by a patient with a debilitating medical condition, or to 12 permit a person to assist with the medical use of marijuana by a patient with a debilitating 13 medical condition, shall have the same force and effect as a registry identification card.

14 (o)(p) Notwithstanding the provisions of § 21-28.6-4(e), no primary caregiver cardholder 15 shall possess an amount of marijuana in excess of twenty-four (24) mature marijuana plants that 16 are accompanied by valid medical marijuana tags and five (5) ounces of usable marijuana, or its 17 equivalent, and an amount of wet marijuana set in regulations promulgated by the departments of 18 health and business regulation for patient cardholders to whom he or she is connected through the 19 department of health's registration process.

20 (p)(q) A qualifying patient or primary caregiver cardholder may give marijuana to 21 another qualifying patient or primary caregiver cardholder to whom they are not connected by the 22 department's registration process, provided that no consideration is paid for the marijuana, and 23 that the recipient does not exceed the limits specified in § 21-28.6-4.

24 (q)(r) Qualifying patient cardholders and primary caregiver cardholders electing to grow 25 marijuana shall only grow at one premises, and this premises shall be registered with the 26 department of health. Except for compassion centers, cooperative cultivations, and licensed 27 cultivators, no more than twenty-four (24) mature marijuana plants that are accompanied by valid 28 medical marijuana tags shall be grown or otherwise located at any one dwelling unit or 29 commercial unit. The number of qualifying patients or primary caregivers residing, owning, 30 renting, growing, or otherwise operating at a dwelling or commercial unit does not affect this 31 limit. The department of health shall promulgate regulations to enforce this provision.

32 (r)(s) For the purposes of medical care, including organ transplants, a patient cardholder's 33 authorized use of marijuana shall be considered the equivalent of the authorized use of any other 34 medication used at the direction of a physician, and shall not constitute the use of an illicit 1 substance.

2 (s)(t) Notwithstanding any other provisions of the general laws, the manufacture of 3 marijuana using a solvent extraction process that includes the use of a compressed, flammable gas 4 as a solvent by a patient cardholder or primary caregiver cardholder shall not be subject to the 5 protections of this chapter.

6 SECTION 2. Chapter 21-28.6 of the General Laws entitled "The Edward O. Hawkins and
7 Thomas C. Slater Medical Marijuana Act" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following
8 sections:

#### 21-28.6-18. Civil liability.

A person whose rights under § 21-18.6-4 have been violated may commence a civil action for injunctive relief and other appropriate equitable relief, and for the award of compensatory and exemplary damages, within three (3) years after the occurrence of the alleged violation of this chapter. An aggrieved person who prevails in an action authorized by this section, in addition to other relief, is entitled to an award of the costs of the litigation and reasonable attorneys' fees in an amount to be fixed by the court.

#### 21-28.6-19. Medical marijuana -- State preemption.

17 <u>The regulation of medical marijuana and compassion centers shall rest solely with the</u>

18 state, except as otherwise specifically provided in this chapter.

19 SECTION 3. Section 28-6.5-2 of the General Laws in Chapter 28-6.5 entitled "Urine and

20 Blood Tests as a Condition of Employment" is hereby amended to read as follows:

21 **<u>28-6.5-2. Testing of prospective employees.</u>** 

(a) Except as provided in subsections (b) and (c) of this section, an employer may require
a job applicant to submit to testing of his or her blood, urine or any other bodily fluid or tissue if:

(1) The job applicant has been given an offer of employment conditioned on theapplicant's receiving a negative test result;

26 (2) The applicant provides the test sample in private, outside the presence of any person;27 and

(3) Positive tests of urine, blood, or any other bodily fluid or tissue are confirmed by a
federal certified laboratory by means of gas chromatography/mass spectrometry or technology
recognized as being at least as scientifically accurate.

(b) The pre-employment drug testing authorized by this section shall not extend to job
applicants for positions with any agency or political subdivision of the state or municipalities,
except for applicants seeking employment as a law enforcement or correctional officer,
firefighter, or any other position where that testing is required by federal law or required for the

- 1 continued receipt of federal funds.
- 2 (c) An employer shall not be required to comply with the conditions of testing under
- 3 subsection (a) of this section to the extent they are inconsistent with federal law.
- 4 (d) Any testing authorized by this chapter shall be subject to the provisions of § 21-28.6-
- 5 <u>4.</u>

of this act.
