It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 34-4 of the General Laws entitled "Estates in Real Property" is
 hereby amended by adding thereto the following section:
- 3 <u>34-4-30. Conveyance to or by nominee trust.</u> (a) Notwithstanding provisions of
 4 section 34-4-27, conveyances of real estate to a nominee trust or to the trustee of a nominee trust
- 5 and conveyances of real estate by a trustee of a nominee trust are not defective, and the
- 6 <u>conveyance shall be deemed valid so long as the following shall have occurred:</u>
- 7 (1) A memorandum of trust pursuant to section 34-4-27 shall have been properly
- 8 prepared and recorded; and
- 9 (2) The trustee of the nominee trust shall include in the memorandum of trust a statement
- 10 that the trustee has received the consent of each of the beneficiaries authorizing the action of the
- 11 <u>trustee as required by the nominee trust.</u>
- 12 (b) A trustee, executing a memorandum of trust and representing that he/she/it has

13 obtained the consent of the beneficiaries, shall be subject to personal liability to each of the

- 14 beneficiaries as well as the grantees and the grantees' successors and/or assigns under the
- 15 instrument purported to be executed with the consent of the beneficiaries, in the event such

16 <u>consent was not obtained.</u>

(c) A nominee trust is defined as a trust in which the trustee(s) is/are not granted
 discretionary authority to act without the consent, concurrence or direction of the beneficiaries.

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EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

OF

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1 This act would allow conveyances into and from nominee trusts pursuant to certain

2 requirements regarding the preparation and recording of a memorandum of trust.

This act would take effect upon passage and would have retroactive effect.

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
