RELATING TO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES -- CRIMINAL PROCEDURE--EXPUNGEMENTS

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

- SECTION 1. Section 3-8-12 of the General Laws in Chapter 3-8 entitled "Regulation of
 Sales" is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 3 3-8-12. Expungement of certain criminal records. -- The court records of conviction of any person convicted of a violation of section 3-8-6, 3-8-9, or 3-8-10, while between the age of 4 5 eighteen (18) to twenty-one (21) shall be expunged without the requirement of filing a motion 6 pursuant to chapter 12-1.3, provided all outstanding court-imposed or court-related fees, fines, 7 costs, assessments, charges and/or any other monetary obligations have been paid. Any and all 8 bail money relating to a case which remains on deposit at the time of the expungement shall be 9 forfeited to the state general fund. 10 SECTION 2. Section 12-1-12.1 of the General Laws in Chapter 12-1 entitled 11 "Identification and Apprehension of Criminals" is hereby amended to read as follows: 12 12-1-12.1. Motion for sealing of records of persons acquitted or otherwise exonerated. -- (a) Any person who is acquitted or otherwise exonerated of all counts in a 13 14 criminal case, including, but not limited to, dismissal or filing of a no true bill or no information,
- 15 may file a motion for the sealing of his or her court records in the case, provided, that no person 16 who has been convicted of a felony shall have his or her court records sealed pursuant to this 17 section.
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(b) Any person filing a motion for sealing his or her court records pursuant to this

1 section shall give notice of the hearing date set by the court to the department of the attorney 2 general and the police department which originally brought the charge against the person at least 3 ten (10) days prior to the hearing.

4 (c) If the court, after the hearing at which all relevant testimony and information shall be 5 considered, finds that the person is entitled to the sealing of the records, it shall order the sealing of the court records of the person in that case. 6

7 (d) The clerk of the court shall, within forty-five (45) days of the order of the court 8 granting the motion, place under seal the court records in the case in which the acquittal, 9 dismissal, no true bill, no information or other exoneration has been entered.

10 (e) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, in all cases involving a filing 11 subsequent to a plea of not guilty, guilty or nolo contendere to a charge of a crime involving 12 domestic violence, the court having jurisdiction over the case shall retain the records of the case 13 for a period of three (3) years from the date of filing. The records shall not be expunged, or 14 sealed, or otherwise destroyed for a period of three (3) years from the date of the filing.

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(f) Any and all bail money relating to a case which remains on deposit at the time of the 16 expungement shall be forfeited to the state general fund.

17 SECTION 3. Sections 12-1.3-2 and 12-1.3-3 of the General Laws in Chapter 12-1.3 18 entitled "Expungement of Criminal Records" are hereby amended to read as follows:

19 12-1.3-2. Motion for expungement. -- (a) Any person who is a first offender may file a 20 motion for the expungement of all records and records of conviction for a felony or misdemeanor 21 by filing a motion in the court in which the conviction took place, provided that no person who 22 has been convicted of a crime of violence shall have his or her records and records of conviction 23 expunged provided all outstanding court-imposed or court-related fees, fines, costs, assessments, 24 charges and/or any other monetary obligations have been paid.

25 (b) Subject to subsection (a) of this section, a person may file a motion for the 26 expungement of records relating to a misdemeanor conviction after five (5) years from the date of 27 the completion of his or her sentence.

28 (c) Subject to subsection (a) of this section, a person may file a motion for the 29 expungement of records relating to a felony conviction after ten (10) years from the date of the 30 completion of his or her sentence.

31 12-1.3-3. Motion for expungement -- Notice -- Hearing -- Criteria for granting. -- (a) 32 Any person filing a motion for expungement of the records of his or her conviction pursuant to 33 section 12-1.3-2 shall give notice of the hearing date set by the court to the department of the 34 attorney general and the police department which originally brought the charge against the person

- 1 at least ten (10) days prior to that date.
- (b) The court, after the hearing at which all relevant testimony and information shall be
 considered, may in its discretion order the expungement of the records of conviction of the person
 filing the motion if it finds:
- 5 (1) That in the five (5) years preceding the filing of the motion, if the conviction was for 6 a misdemeanor, or in the ten (10) years preceding the filing of the motion if the conviction was 7 for a felony, the petitioner has not been convicted nor arrested for any felony or misdemeanor, 8 there are no criminal proceedings pending against the person, the person does not owe any 9 <u>outstanding court-imposed or court-related fees, fines, costs, assessments, and/or charges</u> and he
- 10 or she has exhibited good moral character;

(2) That the petitioner's rehabilitation has been attained to the court's satisfaction and the
 expungement of the records of his or her conviction is consistent with the public interest.

- (c) If the court grants the motion, it shall, after payment by the petitioner of a one hundred dollar (\$100) fee to be paid to the court order all records and records of conviction relating to the conviction expunged and all index and other references to it deleted removed from public inspection. A copy of the order of the court shall be sent to any law enforcement agency and other agency known by either the petitioner, the department of the attorney general, or the court to have possession of the records. Compliance with the order shall be according to the terms specified by the court.
- 20 (d) Any and all bail money relating to a case which remains on deposit at the time of the
 21 expungement shall be forfeited to the state general fund.

SECTION 4. Section 12-10-12 of the General Laws in Chapter 12-10 entitled
"Preliminary Proceedings in District Courts" is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 24 12-10-12. Filing of complaints. -- (a) Subject to any other provisions of law relative to 25 the filing of complaints for particular crimes, any judge of the district court or superior court may 26 place on file any complaint in a criminal case other than a complaint for the commission of a 27 felony or a complaint against a person who has been convicted of a felony or a private complaint. 28 The court may in its discretion require, as a condition of the filing, the performance of services 29 for the public good or may attach any other conditions to it that the court shall determine; 30 provided, in cases where the court ordered restitution totals less than two hundred dollars (\$200) 31 to an injured party pursuant to this section or section 12-19-34, the court shall require that full 32 restitution be made at the time of sentencing if the court determines that the defendant has the 33 present ability to make the restitution.
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(b) It shall be an express condition Express conditions of any filing in accordance with

1 this section shall be that the defendant shall at all times during the one year keep the peace and be 2 of good behavior and shall have paid all outstanding court-imposed or court-related fees, fines, 3 costs, assessment, charges, and/or any other monetary obligations. A violation of that these 4 express conditions or any other condition(s) set by the court shall be deemed a violation 5 of the filing and the matter which was filed may be resurrected by the court. A determination of whether a violation has occurred shall be made by the court in accordance with the procedures 6 7 relating to a violation of probation, sections 12-19-9 and 12-19-14.

8 (c) In the event the complaint was originally filed under this section subsequent to the 9 defendant's plea of guilty or nolo contendere to the charges, the court, if it finds there to have 10 been a violation, may sentence the defendant. In the event the court filed the complaint under this 11 section while the defendant maintained a plea of not guilty, if the court finds there to have been a 12 violation, it may proceed to the further disposition of the complaint according to law. If no action 13 is taken on the complaint for a period of one year following the filing, the complaint shall be 14 automatically quashed and destroyed expunged. All records relating to the complaint shall be 15 expunged pursuant to the provisions of chapter 1.3 of this title. Further, if any record of the 16 complaint has been entered into a docket or alphabetical index, whether kept in writing or in an 17 electronic information storage system or other data compilation system, all references to the 18 identity of the person charged by the complaint shall be removed from the docket or index. No 19 criminal record shall result; provided, that in any civil action for a tort, a plea of guilty or a 20 finding of guilty should be admissible notwithstanding the fact that the complaint has been filed.

21 (d) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, in the event a complaint for 22 a crime involving domestic violence was originally filed under this section subsequent to the 23 defendant's plea of guilty or nolo contendere to the charges, the court, if it finds there to have 24 been a violation, may sentence the defendant. In the event the court filed the complaint for a 25 crime involving domestic violence under this section while the defendant maintained a plea of not 26 guilty, if the court finds there to have been a violation, it may proceed to the further disposition of 27 the complaint for a crime involving domestic violence according to law. If, for a period of one 28 year after the date of filing the defendant is not charged with a violation pursuant to subsection 29 (b) of this section, the filed complaint for the crime involving domestic violence shall be 30 automatically quashed and shall not be resurrected expunged without the requirement of filing a 31 motion pursuant to chapter 12-1.3. If, for a period of three (3) years after the date of filing, the 32 defendant is not charged with a crime involving domestic violence, or if so charged, is acquitted 33 or the complaint is dismissed, all records relating to the filed complaint for a crime involving 34 domestic violence shall be expunged without the requirement of filing a motion pursuant to

1 chapter 12-1.3 pursuant to the provisions of chapter 1.3 of this title. Further, if any record of the 2 complaint for a crime involving domestic violence has been entered into a docket or alphabetical 3 index, whether kept in writing or in an electronic information storage system or other data 4 compilation system, all references to the identity of the person charged by the complaint for a 5 crime involving domestic violence shall be removed from the docket index at the same time the 6 complaint is quashed or destroyed. No criminal records shall result, unless in any civil action for a tort, in which a plea of guilty or a finding of guilty is admissible notwithstanding the fact that 7 8 the complaint has been filed. Provided however, that in sentencing a defendant for a crime 9 involving domestic violence of which the defendant was charged within three (3) years after the 10 filing of a prior crime involving domestic violence to which the defendant pleaded guilty or nolo 11 contendere, the court may take the plea into consideration.

(e) Any and all bail money relating to a case which remains on deposit at the time of the
 expungement shall be forfeited to the state general fund.

SECTION 5. Section 31-41.1-10 of the General Laws in Chapter 31-41.1 entitled
"Adjudication of Traffic Offenses" is hereby amended to read as follows:

16 <u>**31-41.1-10. Expungement. --**</u> All violations within this title which are in the jurisdiction 17 of the traffic tribunal or of a municipal court shall by operation of law, after three (3) years, 18 following adjudication of the violation and after expiration of any mandatory state or federal 19 record-retention period, be <u>deleted expunged</u> from the records of the traffic tribunal or the 20 municipal court and from the records of the division of motor vehicles. These <u>deletions</u> 21 <u>expungements</u> shall be <u>in addition to and not in place of any expungement made without the</u> 22 requirement of filing a motion as provided for by chapter 1.3 of title 12.

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SECTION 6. This act shall take effect upon passage.

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EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

OF

RELATING TO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES -- CRIMINAL PROCEDURE--EXPUNGEMENTS

1 This act would make uniform the process used to handle various types of expungements 2 of court records. The act would also require that all outstanding court-imposed or court-related 3 fees, fines and/or any other monetary obligations owed by a defendant be paid as a condition of 4 expungement and would provide that all bail money relating to a case which remains on deposit 5 at the time of the expungement be forfeited to the state general fund. 6 This act would take effect upon passage.

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
